WORDS IN WINTER AT YANDOIT

This year Yandoit will host two events as part of the Words in Winter festival. On Sunday 18th August at 2pm we'll be Celebrating Life in story, song and poem. Locals are invited to gather at the beautiful and historic Yandoit Uniting Church to share stories about life, via spoken word, song and poetry - a creative way to get to know one another as neighbours and community members living in and around

Yandoit, Clydesdale and Franklinford. This year's theme for Words in Winter is 'Life', which allows plenty of scope. The stories, songs and poems may be your own creations, or the creations of others that have meaning for you. They may be



historical or current. They may be humorous or serious. They may be personal or community based, or anything in between. This is an open mic event where participants have 5 to 10 minutes to share their story, in their chosen format. Not everyone will want to tell a story but those who do will need an audience, so come a long and get to know people in our community. You might find that others telling their stories will inspire you to do the same. Stay around to chat with neighbours

over a cuppa at the end. Entry by donation will support Yandoit Uniting Church to remain in our community.

FRANKLINFORD CEMETERY NEWS

There was a meeting of the Trust members at the cemetery on Sunday 23rd June. The report writer had been to the cemetery to mark where the unmarked graves had been found on the scan. The lines crisscrossed between the existing graves not really interfering with those that are about to be used. The lines marked the length of the grave and showed that some of the occupants were very small – which fits the theory that, in the past, the death of a child led to a speedy burial. Our Secretary Carlene pointed out an area that would be suitable for a Lawn cemetery. Graves are not individually set out with stone sides but rather the marker is a slab on top of the grave and otherwise the lawn remains.

There are two areas at the cemetery that could be used. The geophysical survey has been completed at the cemetery, to identify unmarked graves.
