Our new councilors are: Jen Bray and Lesley Hewitt for Hepburn's Birch ward-Lesley is also Hepburn shire mayor; Juliet Simpson for Holcolme ward; and Matthew Driscoll for Loddon River ward, Mt Alexander shire.

Come and meet your new councillors on Sunday January 24^{th,} 12.45pm, at Clydesdale Hall. Let them know what's important for us and what we value about the places we live in. Come, also, and share a picnic lunch with neighbours, a chance to reconnect after almost a year of covid lockdown. We plan to gather outside to ensure, as much as possible, a covid-safe environment.

There will be a chance to talk informally over picnic lunch with councilors followed by a meeting.

ARTISAN AGRICULTURE SURVEY

Hepburn Shire Council is inviting artisan agriculture producers and growers from the Hepburn Shire, and broader region, to complete the annual Artisan Agriculture Survey. The survey aims to help Council's Artisan Agriculture Project Advisory Group better understand the needs of artisan agriculture businesses and how the project can help support the sector.

The Artisan Agriculture Survey is particularly relevant to small scale regenerative farming enterprises, and hopes to capture what is currently happening, what farmers need money spent on, and ways food can become accessible for



more people.

A LOCAL STRATEGY FOR SHARING & REPAIRING TOOLS & REDUCING WASTE

The idea for a local community tool library has been suggested and this will be further discussed at our meeting with the councilors. Like most older people in the world, Bill has all this useful stuff that he doesn't want to throw out and wants to share with other people who will use the equipment. Things like boxes of screws and nails and bolts and washers, ropes and plumbing bits .Even timber and galvanized tin. This is not a new idea. There have been other places where a shed has been used to leave and collect lendable stuff.

Both Daylesford and Castlemaine operate monthly **Repair Café's** which are recommencing in February. Volunteer fixers have a range of skills including: repairing kitchen, household and garden appliances; sharpening knives and tools: testing electrical equipment; mending clothes; as well as bicycle repair & maintenance.
