YANDOIT SCHOOL- END OF YEAR CONCERT, **FUNDRAISING AND ENROLMENTS FOR 2024**

Come and celebrate our local school including the work and creativity of children, teachers and parent during this past year. The concert will be held at Yandoit Hall on Friday December 8th from 5pm, followed by supper. There's also a whisper that Santa Clause may arrive.

Yandoit's recent community market raised around \$1,100 for the school via coffee, tea, cakes, as well as sausage sizzle and plant sale. Moneys will go towards books for the library, decodable readers and a literacy software package for early years' children. As a small local school, Yandoit is growing with enrolments for next year increasing to 18-20 children, including a few new preps. Yandoit school is a an asset to our community with excellent, committed teachers coupled with the active involvement of parents.

REPORT ON 140TH ANNIVERSARY OF YANDOIT HALL AND COMMUNITY MARKET

The 140th Anniversary of Yandoit Hall, combined with the community market, was a huge success. School fundraising via the fabulous little 'Cafe Hub', along with the School's Sausage Sizzle, was a great success. Thanks to all who donated cakes etc. for the cause and to Ros as Barista Extraordinaire. In addition to the usual



array of stalls. Robert and Nick Morrison's steam engine creation was a wonder for all to behold, especially when pizza's came out of the steam oven! The Hall's Anniversary speeches by Don

Morrison, Carlene Sartori and Andrew Kimpton met with a receptive and interested audience. Don thanked Hepburn shire, especially previous councillor Kate Redwood, for the \$30,000 grant which enabled much needed repairs to be undertaken. The repair work was diligently coordinated by Carlene, secretary/treasurer of the hall. Carlene provided a brief history of the hall, which opened in November 1883 as a Mechanics Institute and public library.

Overseas newspapers were available, keeping residents from



diverse cultural backgrounds informed about their home countries. Books were available to be read and borrowed and to assist with training and further education. Electricity was connected in 1955 and then, in January 1969, fire swept through Yandoit burning down the hall - all that remained standing were the 4 brick external walls. The hall was rebuilt, with the addition of kitchen and toilets. and then re-opened in 1974. Don's participation as an active member of the hall committee since 1954 was acknowledged, and Don, now

aged 92, is bowing out from those responsibilities. Carlene pointed out the lettering on top of the hall, touched up and painted by Andrew Kimpton, another hall committee member. So now we can all appreciate the longevity of this precious community facility.

FUTURE OF YANDOIT CULTURAL

The Community Planning Group recently received good news that Yandoit Cultural's lease with the Uniting Church has been extended for another 12 months. This extension is supported by Castlemaine's Uniting Church minister and church council, also by regional presbytery who have advocated for this extension with Synod, the state-wide body responsible for all church property. As part of the extension agreement, we are creating a faith community- an open concept which interested locals are invited to develop. So our old church in the bush will have two streams: Yandoit Cultural plus Yandoit Faith community. Essentially they will be two separate activities, although there's possibility for some cross-over around particular events. Yandoit Cultural is holding a planning session for 2024. After a remarkably active 2022 and 2023 with music, song, story, open mics, local history and local weddings we welcome everyone's ideas as we plan for the year ahead. Our planning session will be held on Tuesday 19th December, 4.30pm at the Uniting church.

BUSHFIRE READY WORKSHOP



This 2 hour workshop, on Sunday December 10th at 2pm at Yandoit Hall, will help locals pull together a bushfire survival plan that ticks all the boxes. You'll be able to work through your plan with guidance from a CFA specialist. BYO pen. To assist with bushfire preparedness the CFA recommends the following actions: Move your winter woodpile away from house or sheds: Prune tree branches so they're not

overhanging roof or touching walls; Clear your gutters; Keep grass shorter than 10cm; Remove leaves and twigs from around your property; Test anything that is part of your fire plan such as sprinklers, pumps and generators; Check that your home & contents insurance is current and includes a level of cover in line with current building standards and regulations. REPORT ON COMMUNITY MEETING AND PLANNING GROUP AGM

Our Yandoit Clydesdale and Franklinford Community Planning Group AGM and community meeting, held on November 12th, was well attended with residents from across all hamlets. Two ward councillors- Jen Bray (Hepburn Shire) and Matthew Driscoll (Mt Alexander shire)- presented reports and listened to issues and concerns raised by locals. Discussion included the recent tragedy in Daylesford and where support is available (Central Highlands Rural Health); reminders that the fire danger period is starting; free green waste at both Daylesford and Castlemaine transfer stations; road side slashing; nominating locals for Australia/Survival day awards plus Heather Mutimer Honour roll; activities around housing affordability across both shires, including greater permit flexibility for tiny homes as well as connecting spare rooms with tenants; heavy vehicles on narrow local roads; encouraging our biodiversity and managing kangaroos, pigs, deer, and endemic weeds; and agricultural structure plans. Hepburn shire seeks feedback on their arts and culture strategy. Community grants (between \$2-5,00) are open three times per year;; Both Hepburn and Mt Alexander shires have community newsletters and invite participation around future plans/strategies etc. Here are the links:

Some priorities identified by our Community Planning Group for the next 12 months include: finalising our 5 year community plan and implementing some initiatives from the plan; managing weed and pests workshops; positive ageing initiatives; supporting Yandoit school; developing and strengthening relationships towards reconciliation with Djarra/ Dja Dja Wurrung people; continuing and expanding Yandoit Cultural. Also, responding to community issues as they arise.
